This year, Arizona will host the 2008 State American Legion Baseball Tournament as well as the 2008 Western Regional Baseball Tournament. These events will be held in August at the Surprise Sports Complex, Surprise, AZ. We must realize that The American Legion here in Arizona is about to conduct one of its most important years as we will also host the 2008 National Convention. This program matches volunteers in the community with a veteran living in their nursing home. Volunteers come in to visit, play a game of checkers or take them for a stroll in the park next door. There are three levels of commitment depending upon your availability.

Caring Companions are those who have a lot of time and are able to come in once a week to visit with their assigned veteran. These people are matched with someone who has no family or friends in town.

Friends of Veterans are for those volunteers who have busy schedules but still want to make a personal connection with a veteran. Typically they are matched with someone who is more independent, but would still benefit from a friendly visit once in a while. We ask that volunteers visit at least one time a month, but may come more often if time allows.

Special Event Escorts are volunteers who are willing to be placed on our e-mail notification list. We let you know when we need people to help out for special events such as trips to the zoo, serving special holiday meals or helping with a carnival.

Bonding Together For A Successful Event

This month my article is directed more towards the smaller to medium posts that sometimes have trouble getting their activities advertised in the local media. That may be because the event just needs a little "pizzazz" or maybe the public just needs to be able to tie the event to another organization that is getting ink in the paper.

One possible way you might be able to get that "pizzazz" is by "partnering". For those of you who are not familiar with the phrase "partnering", it's a new buzz word that refers to two or more organizations working together for "mutual helpfulness". Their reasons for coming together may be due to limited personnel, location, financial deficiencies or all of the above, but in the long run share in the benefit.

For instance, if your post wants to sponsor a blood drive or some other community event, but due to age or afflictions of your membership are not good sources for donating blood, then partnering is the answer! You may have the facility and with the "pull" of the local blood service, your event will more than likely be front page news!

Of course, partnering for a blood drive is just a suggested event - you may have some other community service that you feel is important like a membership drive, a school supplies drive. The events are limitless, but working with another organization may be the wedge you need to get your foot-in-the-door with the press.

In closing, always keep in mind Public Relations is one of those necessary evils that requires planning, patience and prudence – make a plan, put a good person on the project and watch for your name in the paper!
