National Commander Dellinger Testifies to Senate

Don't Hang Budget Cuts On Veterans

National Commander Daniel Dellinger testified before the Senate and House Committees on Veterans Affairs in September, 2013. Commander Dellinger initiated his testimony to the House and Senate Veterans Affairs Committee by stating that The American Legion did not want the Congress to balance the budget on the backs of America's Veterans. Commander Dellinger quoted from resolution number 34 which states, "American Legion urged Congress and the Administration to cease all efforts to reduce the defense budget from its current level, and to fully fund the Department of Defense in order that our military is unquestionably capable of carrying out its essential mission." Commander Dellinger also discussed Tricare by stating that The American Legion opposes any further increases in Tricare fees including prescription drug fees. He stated that the first priority of the military health system is to provide health care benefits to active duty personnel, however, less than half of Tricare beneficiaries are active duty military personnel and their dependents. The remaining 58% of Tricare beneficiaries are retirees and their dependents, with working-age retirees and their families making up more than a third of the total

The American Legion also requested that the VA be properly funded and that protecting VA sequestration does not protect VA from ordinary, run of the mill budget cuts, and several programs have recently been in jeopardy. A solution must be found to VA's Capital Lease Program that will allow the VA to continue to deliver critical care and services through community-based outpatient clinics (CBOC). Even though the medical budgets of the VA are protected by advanced appropriations, The American Legion would like to extend the entire VA budget to include IT research, construction and the Veterans Benefit Administration (VBA) responsible for

ending the backlog would enjoy the same protections of the medical accounts. This would stabilize and protect Veterans funding in the midst of turbulent fiscal wars on Capitol Hill and the cost would be "zero".

Commander Dellinger also discussed the post 9/11 G.I. Bill by stating that The American Legion wants to protect our Veterans with oversight that includes provisions to evaluate post-secondary education institutions on quality factors and State approving agency's should be returned their original power to protect the G.I. Bill along with adequate funding to execute their mandate. Student Veterans should be allowed in–state tuition rates when they cannot reasonably satisfy residency requirements.

The American Legion also is concerned about Veteran's homelessness and strongly supports the Administration's goal of eliminating Veterans homelessness by 2015 and requests that Congress provide the resources that are necessary to accomplish this goal to include medical, rehabilitative and employment assistance

to homeless Veterans and their families.

The American Legion also strongly supports the administration's goal of eliminating the backlog of VA claims by 2015 and requests that Congress support this goal.

When Congressman Stump from Arizona was Chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, disabled Veterans tax/widows tax was eliminated for Veterans with more than 50% disability. The American Legion would now like to eliminate this tax completely for disabled Veterans and their widows. It simply is not fair for a Veteran to have to pay a tax on his disability that other federal employees are exempt from.

The American Legion remains committed to protecting the American flag and supports legislation that would safeguard the nation's flag from physical desecration. This requires a Constitutional Amendment that is supported by all 50 states, however, it has failed to pass in the Senate, even though it has passed the house several times

Prior to the Commander's testimony, The Arizona Legislative Committee consisting of George Cushing from Surprise; Bobby Reyes from Flagstaff; Cesar Parada from Nogales; and Neal Sundeen from Scottsdale, discussed all of these legislative priorities with Senator John McCain, Senator Jeff Flake, Representative Trent Franks and Representative Ann Kirkpatrick. We also visited with the office of Representative Gosar and spoke to his aide with regards to these point papers. All of the Representatives and our two Senators were supportive of The American Legion and its goals to maintain a strong national defense and support Veterans.

Eagle Scout of the Year Receives Scholarship

During The American Legion's Fall Meetings held in Indianapolis, the Samsung American Legion National Selection Committee announced the 2013 Samsung American Legion Scholarship recipients. One of the nine students receiving a \$20,000 scholarship was Aidan Schneider. He attended Boys State in Flagstaff this past summer where he was awarded the \$1,000 scholarship on the Department level. Aidan attends Northland Preparatory High School in Flagstaff and also was named The American Legion Department of Arizona Eagle Scout of the Year in March. He is to be congratulated for receiving this esteemed honor, well done Aidan.

The Samsung Scholarships are restricted to high school juniors who complete either a Boys State or Girls State program and are a direct descendant - i.e. child, grandchild, great grandchild, etc. - or a legally adopted child of a wartime veteran who served on active duty during at least one of the periods of war officially designated as eligibility dates for American Legion membership.

Again, this is an example of using the programs of the Americanism Pillar. Anyone of the programs can be combined Scouting, Junior Shooting Sports; Oratorical and Boys State. As stated previously, we need to become more involved in the Americanism Program. These are the

programs that strengthen our youth. They are the future of this country.

I am working on a program that will help disabled Veterans. The program – U.S. Veterans Service Corps – would be run through the Order of the Arrow Boy Scouts of America. It will be administered on a chapter level. There are 22 chapters in the Grand Canyon Council and I have assigned each chapter to a particular American Legion Post. There are four BSA Councils in Arizona and I've started with the Grand Canyon Council.

The program will facilitate service projects for members of the Order of the Arrow. They will help disabled Veterans do various jobs around their property. This will include mowing lawns, minor outside repairs and general clean-up projects. The program can also be used as an Eagle Scout Project if done on a larger scale.

I would like to thank my Legion Family for their support in my wife's passing. We were married for 47 years. I would like to thank all who attended her services at National; it meant a great deal to me.

As always, let us not forget our brothers and sisters in harms way.




Veterans Creative Arts Festival Show Us What You Have!
