It was an awesome experience for me and the two days that we visited the "hill" were filled with meeting all but one of our elected

officials. There was a lot of handshaking, picture taking, cafeteria food, walking and stair climbing. The most important part was that all of our Representatives were receptive to the 2015 American Legion Legislative Priorities for the 114th Congress. The following is a listing of what we were asking their support for:

- 1. Fully fund a superior national defense as the global war on terror rages on.
- 2. Continue efforts to reform the Veterans Administration.
- 3. Support more efficient VA claims systems.
- 4. Provide help for Veterans struggling with mental health issues and brain injuries.
- 5. Ensure transition programs are not adversely affected by sequestration.

6. Create opportunities for Veterans in the private sector.

Arizona Delegation Attends Legislative Conference in Washington

Department Commander Andy Jaime led a group of Arizona Legionnaires back to Washington, D.C. to lobby for Veterans benefits and for a strong national defense. While we were in Washington, D.C., we also participated in National Commander Michael Helm's testimony to a joint session of the Senate and House committees on Veterans Affairs.

We met with Senators McCain and Flake, along with House members including Sinema, McSally, Schweikert, Salmon, Gosar, Kirkpatrick, Grijalva, Gallego, and Franks. Commander Jaime asked our two Senators and nine Representatives to

fully fund a superior national defense as the global war on terror rages on. Commander Jaime told our Representatives and Senators that The American Legion believes it is critical to maintain a well-funded Department of Defense to ensure a strong national defense to protect America and its allies from enemies such as the Islamic State. Additionally, The American Legion strongly advocates for a good quality of life for troops in a sensible transition from military service to civilian life.

Commander Jaime also asked our Senators and Congress to continue efforts to reform the VA and

90 Years of Service

"In this city on July 17, 1925, by action of the South Dakota Department of The American Legion, the nationwide organization

of Legion Junior Baseball was proposed as a program of service to the youth of America." Since its beginning over ten million young people have played American Legion Baseball.

During the 1929 season, every state entered teams into competition. 1931 marked the first appearance in championship play of a player who was later to become a big league star. Kirby Highe hurled a complete game for Columbia, South Carolina, and lost the final game in the 14th inning 1 - 0. Ten years later, he was the National League's top pitcher.

Fifty five per cent of Major League Baseball players played American Legion Baseball as teenagers. Nearly 75% of all college players played American Legion Baseball as teenagers. Over 50 American Legion Baseball graduates have been inducted into the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, New York.

The purpose of American Legion Baseball for the past 90 years has been to give young men an opportunity to develop their skills, personal fitness, leadership qualities, and to have fun. The

program has succeeded by giving these boys the opportunity to find themselves, work well with others, get college scholarships, and even become professional baseball players.

Once again, Arizona will see many outstanding players display their

skills and following the highly successful 2014 Regional Tournament that was held in Surprise, Arizona. This year should be competitive and exciting. American Legion Baseball continues to flourish in the Department of Arizona with teams from Area "A" and Area "B" competing for the privilege of going on to the Regional Tournament each year.

As preparation has begun for the 2015 season, I encourage Posts to contact the local high schools in their areas to solicit and sponsor teams to compete in the program.

Our Department Baseball Tournament will be held in Tucson at the Kino Veterans Sports Complex. The games on July 24-25-26 will be played at the South Complex Fields and the Department Championship Game will be played inside Kino Veterans Stadium on Monday, July 27. All current Service Personnel, Veterans and Legion members will not be charged any admission.

The Blue Star Memorial

The Blue Star Memorial Program was originally adopted in 1945 by the National Council of State Garden Clubs (currently named National Garden Clubs) as the Blue Star Memorial Highway Program to honor those who had served in World War II.

Over the years, the program has evolved to include markers to be placed in areas such as parks, historical grounds, and other appropriate civic areas. The marker was also changed to include the words "A tribute to the Armed Forces of America", and to include all men and women who have served, were serving, or would serve in the Armed Forces of the United States of America.

This Blue Star Memorial was dedicated in Ahwatukee Park (4700 E. Warner Rd., Ahwatukee, Arizona 85044) on March 24, 2012. Each memorial is carefully maintained by the sponsoring Garden Club. Garden Clubs, donations, and memorial pavers help fund most of the memorials throughout the U.S.

put an end to the waiting for VA appointments and secret wait lists. He said that there is a need for continued improvement and reform such as strengthening the oversight program. Veterans must have faith that the healthcare system designed for them will be there to meet their needs. Commander Jaime also asked for additional resources and alternative treatments from those suffering from PTSD and traumatic brain injury. Additional resources and alternative treatments must be provided as options for Veterans and Service Members in need of treatments for brain injuries and mental stress.

Commander Jaime also asked our Representatives and Senators to implement a pilot program that would subsidize businesses and non-profit organizations that create on-the-job training opportunities for Veterans. Additionally, extend and improve the work opportunity tax credit for hiring Veterans under the VOW Act.

The American Legion, being the founding author of the original G.I. Bill, believes that the Veterans should be allowed to convert G.I. Bill education funds into capital for business startups. These grants would further the goal of growing the Veteran-owned small business industry, which, in turn would generate jobs for Veterans. The Arizona delegation also asked our Representatives to end Veterans homelessness and oppose increases in TRICARE fees including prescription drug fees.

When National Commander Helm spoke to the joint session of the House and Veterans Affairs Committee, the chairman of the committee stated he would protect the American Flag and The American Legion is committed to protecting Old Glory, and continues to support legislation that safeguards our nation's flag from physical desecration. Members of the Arizona delegation were asked to co-sponsor legislation that the Chairman of the Veterans Affairs Committee presented in the House. Miller said that he had signed and asked other members of Congress to sign on too. This legislation would require a constitutional amendment that is supported by all 50 states, however, it has failed to pass the Senate even though it has passed the House several times.

Prior to the National Commander's testimony, the Arizona Legislature Committee, consisting of Larry Bahill, George Cushing, National Executive Committeemen Dick Perry, Jim Burke, Mike Espinosa and myself, discussed all of these legislative priorities with our Senators and nine Representatives. All of the Representatives and two Senators were supportive of The American Legion and its goals to maintain a strong national defense and support Veterans.
