American Legion National Commander Denise H. Rohan issued the following statement regarding the selection and confirmation process for secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs: "The American Legion is very concerned about the current lack of permanent leadership at the Department of Veterans Affairs. Nearly 100 years ago, The American Legion fought to create the VA, and our two million wartime veteran members view the department as a symbol of the American people's commitment to our nation's veterans. The VA is a physical reminder of our nation's promises to care for those who return from war injured or ill, to

care for the families of the fallen, and to help veterans transition successfully to the civilian economy following their service. "While the VA is the nation's second largest bureaucracy with a budget of \$200 billion and more than 350,000 employees, we believe it is entirely manageable and effective when staffed with motivated, experienced and competent people. Our veterans deserve a properly led, efficient and transparent VA that delivers on the American people's promises.

"The VA has made significant improvements in modernizing and realigning the department since 2014, and was headed in the right direction under the past two incumbents. Our nation's veterans deserve a strong, competent and experienced secretary to lead this vitally important department.

"As a congressionally-chartered veteran service organization, The American Legion does not advocate for or against individuals seeking elected or appointed positions. We expect that whomever is confirmed by the U.S. Senate will be a person of character who takes care of our nation's veterans.

"We have faith in the U.S. Senate's due diligence and will work with whomever they confirm to be the 10th Secretary of the Department of Veterans Affairs."

Soaring to New Heights in Membership Trophy Rules of Award Process

General:

Recruiting events submitted by the Post must reflect an all time high of acquired members for any one event in the community. The event MUST be held away from the Post home. If a Post shows interest in this contest - Thinking outside of the Box, means that the Post must work the program in their community and not in their Post home. The goal is to promote our Posts in our communities; membership will come.

The 2018 National Commander Denise Rohan stated, "We need to work as a Family." The easiest successes come by relying upon all of the Post Family Entities. If a Rider Chapter member is not present, please remember to notify the Post's Rider Officers of new prospects for their program.

Eligibility:

Eligibility is open to all American Legion Family Entities to achieve the award for the Post Family. A member of the Department Membership Committee should be in attendance at the event to verify the number of members gained were joined at the event. These officers are listed in the Department Directory; i.e., District Commander or others.

The latest event eligible is not later than 30 days prior to Department to allow time for reports to arrive to Department for New Member enrollment and event confirmations.

Deadline:

Event closing is Not later than 30 days prior to Department Convention Opening day. The Post which has recruited the highest quantity of members in ONE event by even one member higher than all other Posts is awarded the Soaring to New Heights Trophy for one full year. A Post may conduct as many events as desired to achieve the highest submission.

Process:

- 1. Plan the event. Request the presence of Department Membership Committee. Conduct the event. Suggestion: Assign one team to manage all the actual new member sign-ups and dues collection. This way, the other event volunteers can focus on making the event a great experience and if a visitor decides to inquire about membership, they can be directed to the sign-up team for closing the deal.
- 2. Complete the Entry Form below. Make a copy of the entry form for future Post use. Submit the fully completed form to Department Headquarters through regular channels, confirming receipt as a practice.
- 3. When filling out the Entry Form have Department Membership Committee verify the event on the form. Invite him/her to participate at the event. Let him/her note the exact date of the event and which members of the Legion Family gave support.
- 4. Remember to use information on your Consolidated Post Report. (CPR)
- 5. This trophy will migrate to the next year's awarded Post. Any Post that wins the trophy for three consecutive years is invited to keep the Trophy. A new similar trophy will enter into its place, purchased by the "three-peat" awarded Post.

Local vet continues serving through Team Rubicon volunteerism

Some folks are born with a commitment to service – and that's an apparent trait displayed in one Cornville Legionnaire. A proud Vietnam veteran, Jan Allbright, understands the term "boots on the ground" and continues that "fever" by being a member of Team Rubicon (TR).

Team Rubicon Backgound

Not familiar with TR, it's an organization that came into existence in Jan. 2010 - just eight short years ago and has grown to international strength! It was founded after the 7.8 magnitude earth-quake shook Port-au-Prince, Haiti.

In the days following that earthquake, many traditional aid organizations were slow to establish relief efforts, citing dangerous and unstable working conditions; troubled by the scenes in Port-au-Prince and the lack of proper aid, two Marines, Jake Wood and William McNulty, decided to act. Gathering supplies and volunteers, the small group of veterans, first responders, and medical professionals deployed to Haiti in the days following the earthquake.

Still not sure about the name Team Rubicon" – you'll need to travel back to when Julius Caesar crossed the Rubicon River and marched on Rome, it marked a point of no return. The phrase "crossing the Rubicon" has since survived in reference to any group committing itself to a risky course of action.

As that little band of x-military warriors crossed over the Artibonite River, the natural border between the Dominican Republic and Haiti, the small team of eight volunteers called themselves "Team Rubicon" in reference to the Rubicon River in Rome – by crossing their Rubicon, the team acknowledged they were irrevocably committed to their task of helping those in need; thus, Team Rubicon was born!

Team Rubicon takes life

Team Rubicon is structured along the same regional breakdown as the Federal Emergency Management Agency with 10 regions within the United States. In the past eight years natural disasters have occurred in every developed (and undeveloped) country, big and small. The TR volunteers who make up these committed groups are roughly 70% military veterans. Many of the skills gained in the military – things like emergency medicine, small-unit leadership, logistics, experience in austere environments – translate well to disaster response. Military service does not define a TR member, nor is it required. Many volunteers are pulled from the civil service sector, firefighters, medical professionals, law enforcement officers, teachers, and mental health providers are among the diverse careers. According to Allbright who is the 2nd Vice Commander at the American Legion Cornville Post 135, says he first became aware of the organization in 2015 through his wife, Nancy. The next two years, he spent his free time completing required classes.

His first operation with Team Rubicon was "Hard Hustle" in Houston helping people recover from the hurricane. The second operation was "Old Breed 2" in Southern California helping people cleanup after the Lilac fire. "On both of these occasions," he said, "I was assigned to the "Strike Team" – that's were you do the actual hands on."

"And, on both deployments, I was greeted as a long lost brother by the guys and gals of Team Rubicon. I worked like a dog, fell into bed exhausted and loved every minute of it." He went on to say," it was great to work along-side a group of highly motivated individuals with a solid "mental" mission; something I really miss from the years in the Army".

Allbright responded to "Hard Hustle" during this past Thanksgiving week, while Old Breed 2 was over the holiday season. Like in the military, disasters don't take holidays and the call to respond come at any time!

Allbright is absolutely convinced that if Team Rubicon had been around 50 years ago when he first returned from Vietnam, he would not have experienced as many readjustment issues.

Future goals

Future plans for Allbright? Team Rubicon stands ready and able to respond to all disasters – he assumes that once the mud-slides have been stabilized in Santa Barbara there will be a deployment call up and he says he'll be there! In the meantime, he's furthering his studies and hopes to move into the Incident Management Team.

The only prerequisite required for volunteering with Team Rubicon is a commitment to service. As a "Greyshirt", Team Rubicon members are responsible for providing immediate and impactful aid to communities affected by disaster. Experience is not required. Allbright explained that disaster relief requires a breadth of skillsets and experience, but for the "unskilled" there are various training tracks – from chainsaw operation to heavy equipment to disaster technology.

International organizations take a lot of funding – surprisingly, Team Rubicon's funding comes from individual donors, corporations, foundations, trusts, and businesses - 49% - foundation/nonprofit; 17% individual; and 34% business/corp. They don't accept any public grants or government funding. So, in order to continue their mission of engaging veterans in disaster relief, they truly rely on individual donors. When you join the TR Nation, you're making a big impact - an international organization that publicly touts a money back guarantee!

Department of Arizona Collaborates with College to Focus on Sustainable Solutions to Student Challenges

On February 16, representatives from the Department of Arizona attended a "Day for Visionaries and Innovators: Constructing a Blueprint for Radical Transformation". Mesa Community College (MCC) and the League for Innovation in the Community College cohosted this event which was a forum to build relationships focused on innovative strategies for dramatic change and narrowing the gap in student access and completion, housing, food security, transportation, workforce development and job placement. Assistance for positive student outcomes were forefront in the development of a blueprint based on shared accountability among all 100+ attendees. Those in attendance included educator's, businesses, social services agencies, state philanthropic organizations, city leaders, Veteran services and student government representatives.

The forum began with opening remarks by Dr. Rufus Glasper President & CEO of the League for Innovation followed by important round table discussions. Sonya Pearson, Ph.D., MCC Vice President of Student Affairs stated that "Our intent is to generate results by identifying innovative solutions and designing a creative approach to key areas impeding students from successfully earning a degree or credential" and concluded "The outcome was a collaborative blueprint on how we will proceed with shared accountability."

Monica Sharma, author of Radical Transformational Leadership, was the keynote speaker. Sharma worked for the United Nations for 22 years and is an international expert on radical transformational leadership. Her presentation laid the groundwork for vibrant roundtable discussions focused on what students, particularly those who are typically underrepresented, need to pursue and complete a college education.

The program was created to serve students and citizens with needs and those who are underrepresented within the community who want to pursue an education. Leaders within Mesa Community College were called upon to organize an outreach campaign to leadership in Arizona.

"When I was called upon to invite Veteran and Disability representatives who are leaders in the community and state, I was compelled to contact Domingo Bonilla, Dept. of AZ Commander and Angel Juarez, Dept. of AZ Adjutant immediately, as I knew they would not hesitate to aid" said Dr. Thomas Kusek, Disability Resources and Services Manager and VP of Maricopa Veterans Education Taskforce. He added "We are committed to Veteran Services and Disability Resources and Services, not just within the college, but within our lives." Bill Clites, Director of Veteran Services at MCC, said "When I began employment at MCC, we saw Veterans who didn't have food, nor did they have a roof over their head and we will put them up for a few days and help them through a mentoring program by another Veteran, for what it takes for them to become independent." He added "We now process the largest number of Veterans in the MCC system, but we now do it successfully as retention and education has improved, and most importantly, their lives are improved." Maricopa Community Colleges, is one of the largest community college districts in the United States, serving more than 220,000 students each year in Maricopa County, Az., with an estimated 28,000 Veteran students, Veteran faculty, and Veteran administrators combined.

Current strategic discussions are bringing stakeholders from technology, housing, transportation, food services, city municipalities, Veterans services, American Indian organizations, Disability Service organizations, and public and private developers together to design integrated and intersectional models of the necessary sustainable solutions. Stakeholders, such as the American Legion, who shares common goals, have shown that they are committed to working in uncommon space to achieve greatness—providing more students with basic-need supports necessary to succeed in obtaining a higher education.

"The Veterans Rose Garden" plantings began the winter of 2003 and was completed in 2005. The garden was designed to honor "Past, Present and Future" members who have, are and will serve in the five branches of the United States of America military. All roses planted in this garden are varieties with "patriotic" names. There are over 60 varieties with names such as "About Face, America, Fourth of July, Peace, Purple Heart, Stars and Stripe and Veterans Honor". The garden features our National, State and POW flags along with those of the five Service Branches surrounded by nearly 2,000 roses. The Rose Garden at MCC is an excellent example of the unique and outstanding results that can be achieved through one of the Mesa Community College's community partnerships.

The garden also bears a Blue Star Memorial Marker, a program started after World War II by the National Garden Clubs to remember military veterans along highways nationwide.

In 1996, non-highway sites such as Veterans hospitals and national cemeteries became eligible to carry the marker.

The statue portrays Ernest W. McFarland, father of the GI Bill of Rights, passing a document to a second figure dressed in a military uniform. They each have one foot resting on a step symbolizing the step up offered to returning service men through the Bill of Rights.

Not forgetting his veteran roots, McFarland became interested in legislation to benefit veterans returning from World War II.

He outlined his proposals before The American Legion in a speech in 1943 and worked to create support for his G.I. Bill with veterans' organizations and members of Congress.

By unanimous votes, the United States Senate and the House of Representatives approved the legislation in March and May, respectively and, on June 22, 1944, President Franklin Roosevelt signed the G.I. Bill into law.

On March 28, 2018, Denise Rohan, National Commander also visited Mesa Community College. Representation from Student Veterans Affairs of MCC, Student Veterans Association, Maricopa Veterans Education Taskforce and Disability Resources and Services were on hand to welcome Commander Rohan to Mesa Community College. The Commander was accompanied by the Department of Arizona American Legion. The National Commander addressed a group of student veterans answering inspiring questions and giving advice on education. She spoke of the importance of reaching out to the community and Veterans aiding with assistance whenever possible.
