"A Constitutional Speech Contest"

The American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship Program started in the 1934-1935 School Year at the state level in Kansas City, Missouri by William A. Kitchen a past Department Commander of Missouri. The first National Oratorical Contest was held in Norman, Oklahoma in 1938. The first National Winner that year was John Janson of Phoenix, Arizona.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the American Legion High School Oratorical Scholarship Program is to develop a deeper knowledge and appreciation of the Constitution of the United States on the part of High School students. Other objectives include the development of leadership qualities, and the ability to think and speak Clearly and intelligently, and the preparation for the acceptance of the duties and responsibilities, the rights and privileges of American citizenship. Another purpose is to assist students in paying for their college education. The National first place winner takes home \$25,000, the next two winners take home \$22,500 and \$20,000. First round participants in the National contest receive a \$1,500 scholarship. Second round participants do advance to the final round receive an additional \$1,500 scholarship.

THE DEPARTMENT PRIZES ARE AS FOLLOWS:

<u>First Prize</u> - \$1700.00 plus an additional \$2000.00 scholarship upon participation in the First Round of the National Finals in Hillsdale, Michigan

All Contestants at the Department Finals receive Cash Scholarships. The Department AZ Oratorical champion will automatically advance into the National American Legion Oratorical Competition. Finalist receive full airfare, room, meals and transportation to and from National contest.

The FIRST and SECOND ROUNDS of the

National Contest will be held of May 16, 17

The NATIONAL FINALS will be held on

Sunday, March 18th, 2025 followed by a banquet honoring all the contestants.

2025 ASSIGNED TOPICS

Amendment 1

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances.

Amendment VII

In Suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise re-examined in any Court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Amendment XVIII

Section 1. After one year from the ratification of this article the manufacture, sale, or transportation of intoxicating liquors within, the importation thereof into, or the exportation thereof from the United States and all territory subject to the jurisdiction thereof for beverage purposes is hereby prohibited

Section 2. The Congress and the several States shall have concurrent power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Section 3. This article shall be inoperative unless it shall have been ratified as an amendment to the Constitution by the legislatures of the several States, as provided in the Constitution, within seven years from the date of the submission hereof to the States by the Congress.

Amendment XXVI

Section 1. The right of citizens of the United States, who are eighteen years of age or older, to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of age.

Section 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.
